## PARTY RESPONSIBLY



### ORDINANCE OF UNRULY GATHERINGS

#### What is it?

A City of Eugene law that holds individuals criminally and civilly responsible for hosting or allowing an unruly event or social gathering where alcohol is served or consumed, and where any two or more violations occur. What could it cost you? Violators will be issued citations of as much as \$1,000, and repeat offenders will also have to pay for police, fire, and emergency response costs as well as the cost of repairing damage to public property.

#### Know how to throw a responsible party and stay in control.

- 1. Control the guest list and keep the party small
- 2. No minors
- 3. Notify your neighbors of your plans
- 4. Control quantity and access to alcohol; prevent drunk driving
- 5. Clean up debris from your yard or the street
- Ask for help and lower your chances of getting a fine.

### OREGON'S MARIJUANA LAW AND UO STUDENTS

Learn what's legal and what's not at whatslegaloregon.com. Remember that the University of Oregon is a smoke-and tobacco-free campus. Students are subject to the Student Conduct Code, which prohibits use, possession, sale, distribution, or cultivation of marijuana. Even if you are 21 or over, your landlord has the right to prohibit manufacture and possession of marijuana at your rental property.

### STUDENT CONDUCT CODE: OFF-CAMPUS ACCOUNTABILITY

The primary purpose of the Student Conduct Code is to establish the community standards and procedures necessary to maintain and protect an environment conducive to learning and in keeping with the educational objectives of the University of Oregon.

- · Students may be held accountable for their behavior off campus, including occasions where students are warned or cited by a law enforcement agency
- · The student conduct process is confidential
- Restorative justice may be an option for some student conduct cases

### KNOW THE LAW

- · You'll want to avoid getting to know police officers and judges for the wrong reasons
- · Even after a crime is removed from your record, future employers may find information about your past indiscretions on the internet

#### Want to avoid this possibility? Don't commit the crime!

Here are some of Oregon's laws and their consequences:

LAWS	Offense	Fine
Prohibited Noise	Crime	up to \$500 (jailing offense)
Prohibited Noise	Crime	up to \$1,000 (jailing offense)
Rioting	Class C felony	up to \$125,000 (jailing offense)
Minor in Possession of Alcohol	Violation	up to \$360
Furnishing Alcohol to a Minor	Class A misdemeanor	up to \$6,260 (jailing offense)
Allowing Alcohol Consumption by Minors	violation	up to \$1,000
Open Container or Consumption in Public	Crime	up to \$500 (jailing offense)
Use of Marijuana in Public Place	Class B violation	up to \$260
Minor in Possession of Marijuana	Class B violation	up to \$260
