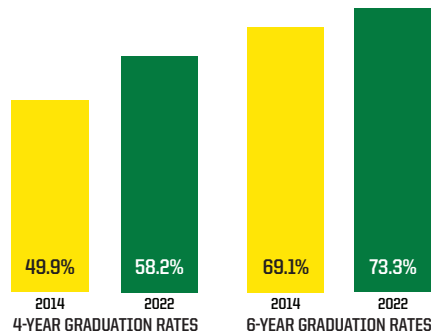

UO'S 4-YEAR GRADUATION RATE HAS INCREASED BY ALMOST 8% IN NINE YEARS

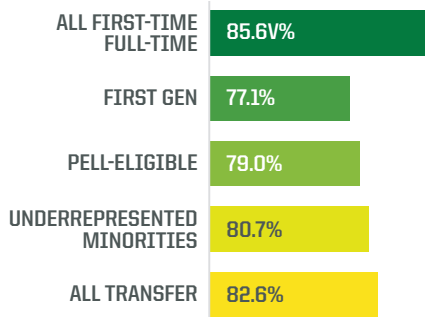

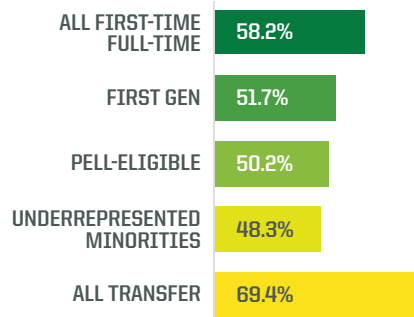

THE UO SUPPORTS STUDENTS IN GRADUATING ON TIME

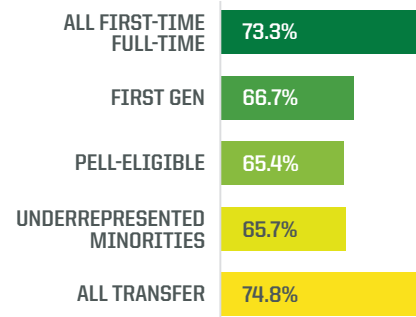
Retention Rates*

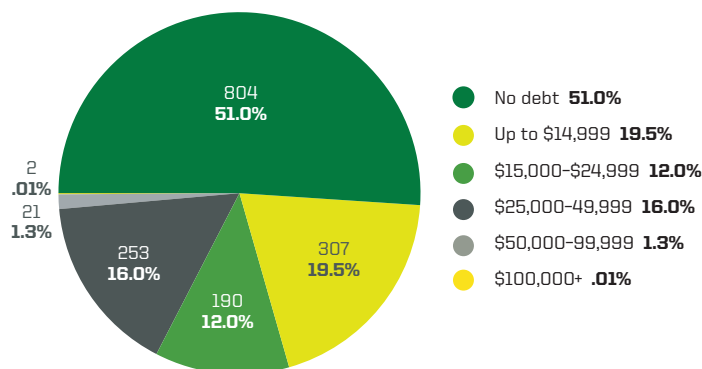

STUDENT DEBT AT GRADUATION, 2021-22

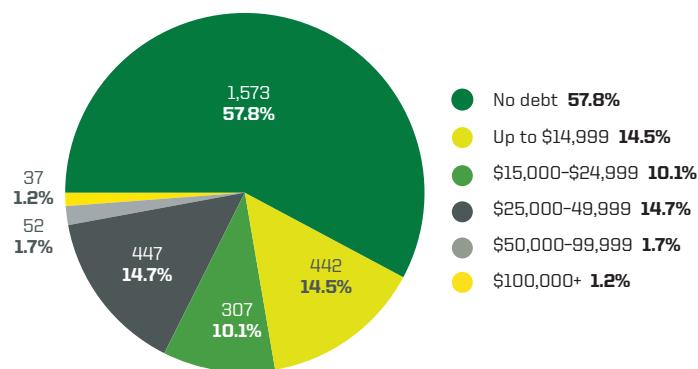
RESIDENT UNDERGRADUATE STUDENTS

UO students are career ready: within 6 months of graduation, 82% of recent graduates are working, attending school, or performing some type of intensive service (e.g. Peace Corps). Among UO's top 10 peer institutions, only two report a higher percentage of recent graduates working or continuing their education.

DOUBLE THE PELL GRANT

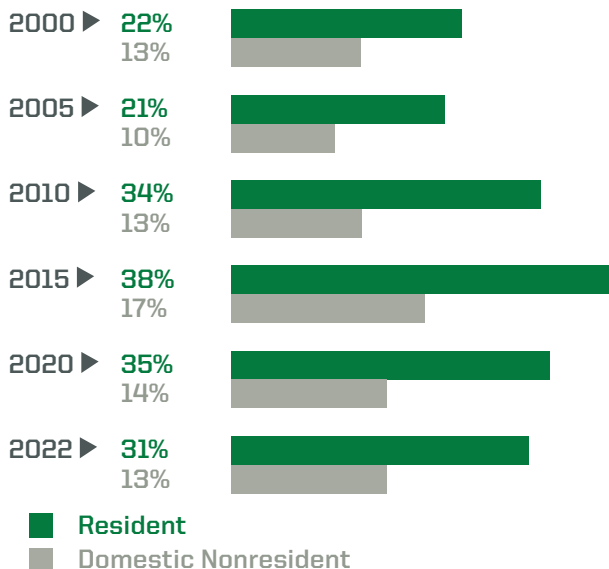
Pell Grants are the federal government’s main tool for helping low-income students afford college. In 1980, Pell Grants covered more than 75 percent of the cost to attend a 4-year public university. Today the maximum award covers just 28 percent. The maximum award for the 2023-24 year is \$7,395.

Pell Grants help nearly 7 million low and moderate-income students attend and complete college annually. That is 40 percent of undergraduates at U.S. colleges and universities.

Pell Grants are especially critical for students of color, with nearly 60 percent of Black students, and roughly half of American Indian or Alaska Native students and Hispanic students receiving a Pell Grant each year.

Over 1,200 organizations, including nearly 900 colleges and universities, have signaled their support for doubling the maximum award amount to \$13,000.
