
NUMBER OF DEGREES CONFERRED BY OREGON'S SEVEN PUBLIC UNIVERSITIES, 2022



OREGON STUDENTS NEED YOUR HELP

Oregon's public universities are 45th in the nation for state funding per student. We can do better—for students and for Oregon. Students need stable tuition. More financial aid. Safe, modern buildings. And a state that believes in them as much as they believe in themselves.

When we invest in them, we invest in Oregon's future.

EXAMPLES OF TODAY'S UO STUDENTS BECOMING TOMORROW'S WORKFORCE IN OREGON

Placing Trained Scientists with Companies: Established in 1998, each year 80–100 students in the Knight Campus Graduate Internship Program (KCGIP) pursue professional master's degrees in areas of semiconductors, optics, polymers, sensors, and genomics and are placed in paid internships at companies in Oregon and beyond. Ninety percent of internship program graduates are employed within their field in three months, and more than 30 partner companies in Oregon have benefitted from skilled scientists with real-word experience.

Partnering with Community Colleges to Prepare Students for Careers in Industrial Research Fields: A new National Science Foundation grant-funded program, Oregon Pathways to Industrial Research Careers, will support up to 64 Pell grant-eligible students as they move through community college and the UO to high-wage science and engineering careers. Students start at Lane, Umpqua, and Central Oregon CCs, transfer to UO to science degrees, and then pursue an industry-focused master's degree through the KCGIP.

Creating Child Behavioral Health Professionals: The Ballmer Institute for Children's Behavioral Health, located at the UO's new NE Portland campus, establishes a new national model for behavioral and mental health care by uniting the UO's topranked research programs, Oregon public schools and families,

and community support groups in the creation and delivery of intervention and treatment programs. Launching in fall 2023, the program will train bachelor's degree level professionals prepared to enter the workforce immediately upon graduation. Responding to the request for new tools for meeting the urgent behavioral health promotion needs of students, a graduate-level credential program for K-12 educators was launched in fall 2022 with more than 90 teachers enrolled from 15 school districts in Oregon and Washington.

Training Tomorrow's Clinicians and Medical Professionals:

Based in the UO's highly-ranked College of Education, the HEDCO Clinic is a multi-disciplinary training clinic that in FY21 produced more than 100 student professionals while serving more than 800 community clients. Students are trained in an integrated healthcare center by faculty researchers and clinicians who have developed comprehensive, evidence-based services in the areas of autism, speech-language-hearing, and cognitive and language abilities after brain injury.

The UO also provides guidance and support to student pursuing advance degrees in the medical filed through its Health Professions Program. The program provides academic advising, scholarships, MCAT prep, a pharmacy bridge program, scholarships, and more to students striving for careers as varied as medical technology, nursing, athletic training, physical therapy, and public health.
